


At home, in a hospital, or nursing home

MINISTERS OF CARE FALL RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING





UNITY OF POSTURE IN THE BODY OF CHRIST

PART IV

In part IV of this series, I hope to wrap up this brief overview or introduction on posture in liturgy. Parts I-III ground the conversation in the Church's liturgical documents and current practice established for the dioceses of the United States. Be sure to read those (available online) before reading Part IV.

The overall point-and maybe too simply stated-for this series is to say standing during the Eucharistic Prayer was the norm up through the thirteenth century when genuflecting (or even kneeling) became standard practice at the words of consecration. As I noted in Part I, it was the US Bishops and their approved adaptation to the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* that prescribed kneeling from the end of the Sanctus until after the Amen.

If you go to the original Latin text promulgated after the Second Vatican Council it is clear that "the ancient practice of standing for prayer has thus been restored as the norm, but the thirteenth-century exception (kneeling at the consecration) has nevertheless been main-



tained." Yes, the Second Vatican Council restored standing at the universal norm during the Eucharistic Prayer. But, the GIRM (without the US adaptations incorporated) goes on to say that Bishops' Conferences should adapt the GIRM to the customs of the local church. Hence, how kneeling in the United States became the norm (see GIRM 43) and why around the world you may encounter varying practices.

Here's a side-by-side comparison of the Latin text with the current English text in the GIRM adapted for the United States.

Latin Original no. 43	Latin Original no. 43	English adapt. for US no. 43
Genuflectant vero, nisi valetudinis causa, vel ob angustiam loci vel frequentiorem numerum adstantium aliasve rationabiles causas impediantur, ad consecrationem. Hi vero qui non genuflectunt ad consecrationem, inclinationem profundam peragant dum sacerdos genuflectit post consecrrationem.	They should kneel at the consecration unless prevented by the lack of space, the number of people present, or some other good reasons. Loose translation	In the Dioceses of the United States of America, they should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer, except when prevented on occasion by ill health, or for reasons of lack of space, of the large number of people present, or for another suitable cause.

From this, you can see how the US Bishops adapted the text for the Church in the United States as well as how they incorporated parts of the original text.

What is extremely interesting to note, and often overlooked or ignored, is the GIRM states: "However, those who do not kneel ought to make a profound bow when the Priest genuflects after the Consecration" (no. 43). So, while we were in the gym for Mass, it would have been the norm and proper for the entire assembly to bow (not kneeling, as some did, in order to retain the unity of posture as noted in previous articles) when the presider genuflected both after the consecration of the bread and the wine. Again, this note in the Church's law stresses the importance of the unity of the assembly's posture. These things are not left to individual discretion.

For example, the assembly is asked to bow at other times in the Mass, but these too may be forgotten, not taught, or overlooked. One is during the Profession of Faith (Apostles' or Nicene Creed). The "Order of Mass" instructs the assembly to bow "At the words that follow:" and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man (Nicene Creed) or in the Apostles' Creed during this phrase: who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary. Is this something you practice during Mass? If not, be attentive to incorporate this posture into your prayer.

There are many gestures and postures included in the liturgy and the Church's documents firmly teach that the Body of Christ, the gathered assembly, in its prayer should assume a unified posture. It is clear that one's person preferences or piety do not dictate the prayer posture at Mass and so this is a cause of reflection for all of us. Take a moment to assess the way you are engaging in prayer in the midst of the celebrating assembly. Ask: Is my personal preference trumping that of the needs of the community? Am I in sync with the rhythm of the praying assembly and attuned to how the community prays? I know this short series just scratches the surface, but I hope it sparked some thoughts and opened up some of what the Church teaches and why.

Care for God's Creation






St. Thomas the Apostle School

CONGRATULATIONS BISHOP PERRY!

On Tuesday, September 19, 2023, Cardinal-designate Christophe Pierre, apostolic nuncio to the United States, publicized that Pope Francis accepted the resignation of the Most Reverend Joseph N. Perry, Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago and Titular Bishop of Lead. Bishop Perry celebrated his 75th birthday on April 18 of this year. All bishops are required to submit a letter of resignation on their 75th birthday.


Bishop Perry was ordained to the priesthood on May 24, 1975 for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Pope St. John Paul II appointed him Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago and Titular Bishop of Lead on May 5, 1998. Bishop Perry has faithfully served the people of the Archdiocese of Chicago for 25 years.

Throughout his priestly and episcopal ministry, Bishop Perry has served in a variety of roles, including

- Vice-President of the board of the National Black Catholic Congress
- Chairman of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops Subcommittee on African-American Affairs
- Archdiocesan Postulator for the cause for sainthood for Fr. Augustus Tolton
- Associate Pastor at St. Nicholas, Milwaukee, WI
- Pastor of All Saints, Milwaukee, WI
- Member of the Tribunal for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee
- Instructor of Canon Law at Sacred Heart School of Theology, Hales Corner, WI; Marquette University Law School, Milwaukee, WI; Mundelein Seminary, Mundelein, IL

Bishop Perry has a great love for the liturgy and for the people of God. His prayerful dedication to his priestly ministry has given us a model of faithfulness and provided a witness of his love for God. We are fortunate to have him in residence here at St. Thomas the Apostle and wish him well in his retirement.

With gratitude, thank you Bishop Perry for not only responding to God's call, but for your many years of service to the Church, especially here in Chicago. May the Holy Spirit continue to fill you with the fire of his love.
