# FROM THE Pastor's Desk

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Thomas the Apostle,

# ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Saturday, October 21 during the 4:00 p.m. Mass

The Church states that "Great care . . . should be taken to see that those . . . whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age receive the sacrament (*Pastoral Care of the Sick*, no. 8).

Any baptized Catholic, over the age of seven, may receive the sacrament if he or she has reasonably judged the seriousness of the illness and remains free of serious sin.

Please call the parish office at **773.324.2626** if you desire to celebrate the Sacrament of Anointing.

Pre-registration is required.

#### ANOINTING OF THE SICK II: CELEBRATING THE SACRAMENT

The sacrament of the anointing of the sick is a celebration in which those who are seriously ill or infirm


are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death. The sacrament may be celebrated in the context of a Mass, or on its own, depending on the needs of the person who is sick.

The celebration opens with brief introductory rites that help us remember that God is with us and that we are the body of Christ. Then follows a liturgy of the word, in which we hear scriptures that shed light on the meaning of sickness and suffering and the compassion of our God, who suffers with us. Depending on the needs of the person who is sick, one brief passage or two or three readings and a psalm may be used. A homily may be preached, too.

Then the rite continues. The gathered church surrounds the person who is sick with the prayer of faith. In response to God's word, a litany is prayed. Then, the priest does the laying on of hands, an ancient sign of the moving of the Holy Spirit to heal and save. This is done in silence. Then a prayer is said over the oil of the sick. Finally, the priest anoints the head and the hands, and sometimes other parts of the body (the feet, for example, or the part of the body that is in pain) of the one who is sick. While anointing the sick person's head, the priest says "Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit." And all answer "Amen!" While anointing the hands, the priest says, "May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." And

again, all answer "Amen!" If other parts of the body are anointed, no words are said. A final prayer is then said.

The liturgy of the eucharist, or simply the giving of communion, may follow. Or the rite ends with a blessing. If you or someone you know is in need of the anointing, please call the parish office.

### **W** Order of Mass

**THE ORDER** of Mass is the script we follow for every celebration of the Eucharist. It contains the words and movements that are repeated at every Mass, from the Sign of the Cross to the Dismissal. It does not include the readings nor any of the hymns. It is the parts of the Mass that stay the same.

The Order of Mass is located in the middle of *The Roman Missal*—the big red book that rests on the altar or in the hands of a server. The Order of Mass also appears in many books and pamphlets that people use to participate at Mass. Most Catholics know their lines very well, though sometimes they consult the Order of Mass for long texts, such as the Glory to God and the Creed. Visitors find the Order of Mass helpful to figure out what is happening when, what words to say, and what postures to adopt.

In the year 2002, the Vatican issued a revised edition of *The Roman Missal*. Although the Order of Mass did not change very much, the publication of this volume in Latin prompted a new English translation of its contents.

New words always cause some initial confusion and frustration. But it is hoped that this new translation and any future adaptations from Rome will help Catholics pray with more attention and understanding.

# FAMILY FAITH FORMATION MONTHLY THEME BISHOP, CATHEDRAL, DIOCESE

This month we are exploring the relationship between our parish community and the universal Church. While the individual parish serves the needs of the people of a specific geographical area, we are part of the universal Church. The universal Church is divided into dioceses, which are also known as "particular churches." The church in the United States is comprised of 176 dioceses, of which 32 are archdioceses. In addition, there is the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA.

According to the *Code of Canon Law*, a diocese is "a portion of the people of God which is entrusted to a bishop for him to shepherd with the cooperation of the presbyterum, so that . . . it constitutes a particular church in which the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church of Christ is truly present and operative" (§369). Dioceses are only established by the pope. Within the dioceses, smaller groupings of parishes may be established as deaneries or vicariates. These allow for collaboration, support, and pastoral care through common action among parishes located near each other. St. Thomas the Apostle is part of Deanery VI-B, of Vicariate VI, of the Archdiocese of Chicago.

### Children's Stewardship

Every parent wants to raise children who share and give generously.
