



FROM THE Pastor's Desk

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Thomas the Apostle,

Ninety Nine years ago this week, a resident of Hyde Park walking down 55th street passing Kimbark would have seen a very different site than what we experience today. In October 1923, there would have been a Gothic structure facing 55th street and behind it would have been a construction site to build an edifice that was completely different from anything convention at the time would have predicted.

October 12th marks the 99th anniversary of the dedication of our church building. While the parish is 154 years old, this year we celebrate the 99th anniversary of the dedication of our church building. This third building, designed by famed architect Francis Barry Byrne, to the glory of God and the service of God's people in extraordinary variety is a testimony to our continued presence in the neighborhood.

Sometimes, as I drive up to the church on Kimbark, I imagine what the wonder of those walking by 99 years ago experienced as they saw a unique building rise from the ground. The sacrifices that were made by the community under the leadership of Msgr. Thomas V. Shannon to build this place that would bring heaven and earth together in the Mass. In the intervening years the innumerable baptisms, weddings, first communions, confirmations, funerals, devotions, tears, and thanksgivings to God for an answered prayer is something that always causes amazement in my own mind.

The people who have worshiped in this building through the 99 years have seen a city change, grow, struggle, come to terms, and all the while have been able to do it in their spiritual home. Fiery homilies from the high pulpit about social justice, seeing Christ in our sisters, and brothers, and beautiful music which raised our hearts to heaven. When I think about all these things that took, and continue to take place, in this space I remember that we are part of a living history that transcends not only the physical, but the spiritual.

My hope is that next year, October 12, 2024 we can come together in a parish celebration to thank God for being able to pray in this building for 100 years.

I hope you can join us this Thursday, October 12, 2023 as we celebrate this anniversary with evening prayer at 7 PM and to hear our fall distinguished preacher, Fr. John Kartje. Fr. Kartje worshiped here during his years as a student at the University of Chicago while he was working on his


doctorate.


RECEIVE COMMUNION

Celebration of the Sacrament of the

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Saturday, October 21 during the 4:00 p.m. Mass



We get hurt. We wear out. The lungs, the eyes, the memory, and any of the many limbs and organs that compose us break or ache. Gloom comes over us then: pity for ourselves, sorrow, depression, anger. But hope can come, too, and courage, and sometimes

All of this is marked and celebrated in the rites of our tradition. With a word and a deed, with touch and breath and spit and mud, Jesus heals those who ail. In every place and time, we who are the church remember and tell stories of healing, anoint the sick with oil and share the one bread even with those who cannot assemble for Mass. Thus the sick and the healthy, the homebound and the spry, saints and sinners are made one and remain one, a single body of many parts.

Anyone who is seriously ill can be anointed, including the elderly who become weaker, even if no illness is present; those waiting for surgery when a serious condition is the reason for the operation; sick children who have sufficient use of reason to be helped by the celebration; and those who are unconscious or who have lost the use of reason, provided that they probably would have asked for the sacrament had they the use of their faculties. Furthermore, many forms of mental illness are now known to be serious. So the mentally ill may be anointed, provided that they will be helped and not harmed by the rite. If you have questions, consult a priest or other parish leader.

The most complete celebration of the sacrament is a communal one, a celebration in which those to be anointed are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home, or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death.
