

Solution Book of the Names of the Dead

SOME PARISHES display a *Book of the Names* of the *Dead*. The book keeps an informal record of members who have died and can be put on public view to help the living remember the dead.

The Catholic Church requires every parish to maintain a register of deaths. After each funeral, the name of the deceased is to be inscribed in this parish register. A secretary usually enters the data, but the pastor is ultimately responsible. This register is usually kept in the parish office, where it serves as a reference book. Every parish is obliged to keep one.

But some parishes display a second book of the dead. There is no requirement for it, but some use one.

A book of the dead usually contains numerous blank pages bound by an ornate cover, decorated with Christian art, and displayed on a handsome table or desk.

In some parishes, a member of the family is invited to inscribe the name of the deceased in the book. Other pertinent information may be kept—for example, the date of death, the date of the funeral, and/or the name of the cemetery where the remains can be found.

The book may be displayed near the door of the church or in a side chapel. Some parishes leave the book on permanent display. Others bring it out for occasions like a wake, a funeral, All Souls Day, or throughout the month of November.

Carefully maintained and properly displayed, a book of the dead reminds the living of the people they loved and lost. It records names of the body of Christ and inspires prayer for their eternal rest.




ADVENT: THE KINGDOM OF GOD: THE ESSENTIAL MESSAGE OF JESUS





M. Roger Holland, II is Teaching Associate Professor in Music and Religion and Director of The Spirituals Project at the Lamont School of Music, University of Denver. A graduate of Union Theological Seminary where he received an MIDI degree, Roger also served as Artist-in-Residence and director of the Union Gospel Choir for over 13 years. In 2015, Union awarded him the Trailblazers Distinguished Alumni Award. Roger toured with The Boys Choir of Harlem, served as Minister of Music for Our Lady of Charity Roman Catholic Church in Brooklyn, NY for 12 years and is Liturgical Music Consultant for the New York Archdiocese Office of Black Ministry. He has played for the Broadway productions of Oprah Winfrey's The Color Purple and the Tony award winning show, Memphis. In 2016, Cardinal Dolan of the Archdiocese of New York presented Roger with the Pierre Toussaint Medallion for service.



Kim R. Harris is Assistant Professor of African American Religious Thought and Practice in the Department of Theological Studies at Loyola Manymount University. She is a liturgist, composer and recording artist, presenting lectures on the music of the Black Catholic Representage the historic Negro Spirituals, and the freedom song of modern Civil Rights Movement. Harris is a member of the Black Catholic Theological Symposium and the North American Academy of Liturgy. She is an academic member of the African American Catholic Center for Evangelization in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, as well as a liturgical consultant for the Archdiocese of New York Office of Black Ministry. Harris searned a PhD in worship and the arts from Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York.

National Black Catholic History Month

The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States voted on Tuesday July 24, 1990 to designate November as Black Catholic History Month.

Servant of God Sister Thea Bowman, FSPA

December 29, 1937–March 30, 1990

Blessed with extraordinary talent, Thea Bowman was a singer, poet, dynamic preacher, master teacher, evangelist, and an African American catalyst. Thea Bowman was born in 1937, the daughter of a doctor and a teacher. She was raised in Canton, Mississippi. At age nine, she asked her parents if she could become a Catholic. The Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration and the Missionary Servants of the Most Holy Trinity, who taught her, nurtured her faith.

Growing up, Thea listened and learned from the wit and wisdom of family members and those in the community. Ever precocious, she would ask questions and seek new insights on how her elders lived, thrived and survived. She was exposed to the richness of the African-American culture: its history and stories, music and songs, customs and rituals, prayers and symbols.

After 16 years of teaching, the bishop of Jackson, Mississippi, invited her to become the consultant for intercultural awareness. In this role, spoke at lively gatherings around the country that combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer, and storytelling. Her programs were directed to break down racial and cultural barriers. She encouraged people to communicate with one another so that they could understand other cultures and races.

In 1984, Sr. Thea was diagnosed with breast cancer. She prayed "to live until I die." Her prayer was answered, and Thea continued her gatherings seated in a wheelchair. In 1989, she spoke the US Bishops and at the end of the meeting, at Thea's invitation, the bishops stood and sang "We Shall Overcome" with gusto. Thea lived a full life. She fought evil, especially prejudice, suspicion, hatred, and things that drive people apart. She fought for God and God's people until her death in 1990.

The Path to SAINTHOOD

The local bishop opens a cause for the person's

sainthood that examines the life and writings of the candidate. If found to have lived a holy life a report is submitted to the Vatican.

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Venerable Augustus Tolton

April 1, 1854--July 9, 1897

Augustus was born in Missouri to two slaves, Peter Paul and Martha Jane Tolton, on April 1, 1854. His father served in the Union Army and was one of the 180,000 blacks who were killed in the war. His widow decided that she would see her husband's quest for freedom realized in his children. Crossing the Mississippi River, she settled in the small town of Quincy, IL. When her children attempted to attend Catholic school to be educated by the Sisters of Notre Dame, parents of the other school children were not happy. So the Sisters of Notre Dame decided to tutor the Tolton children privately. He eventually graduated from St. Peter's School in 1872 at the age of 18.

As Augustus grew older, he began to display an interest in the priesthood. His parish priests, Frs. McGuirr and Richardt, encouraged the young man in this aspiration and tried to enroll in several diocesan seminaries, but without success. They then decided to begin Augustus' education in theology themselves. Finally in 1878, St. Francis College in Quincy accepted Augustus, and two years later he was enrolled at the Collegium Urbanum de Propaganda Fide in Rome.

After completing his courses, Tolton was ordained on April 24, 1886. His first assignment was Saint Joseph parish in Quincy, where he served for two years and gained enormous respect from many of the German and Irish parishioners. In 1889, he was given a mission on the south side of Chicago, Saint Augustine, which later grew into Saint Monica's parish. This would be Fr. Tolton's parish for life, and the center from which he ministered to all the Black Catholics of Chicago. He addressed the First Colored Catholic Congress in Washington, DC in 1889.

According to the Chicago Tribune, Tolton "died at Mercy Hospital at 8:30 p.m., a victim of the intense heat."
