

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Thomas the Apostle,

We are almost at the end of the liturgical year. Readings give us once again, the opportunity to turn towards the end of times. Last Sunday we were invited to stay awake for we do not know the day the Kingdom of God will come. Today, we are invited to work for the coming of the Kingdom of God. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples the parable of the talents, which we also find in Luke 19:11-27. "A man gave his possessions or "talents" to three different servants and evaluated what they did with their talents. One way to interpret this parable is to see Jesus as the man going on a journey, us as the servants and the talents as our gifts. Jesus has given us the talents of his Word, his Eucharist, his mercy, his love. Jesus has given us brothers and sisters to love no matter their origin, color, social class or religion. God calls us to build his Kingdom, a world of love. Jesus asks us not to keep our talents buried in the ground but to use them for the benefit of our brothers and sisters. One day we will be asked to give an account of our gifts. Let us not be the lazy servant who hides his talents but the ones who use them wisely. We are all called to work for the kingdom of God, and it should appear in our daily lives. Each of us according to how we use our gifts, will be invited to enter the joy of Christ at the end of times. Jesus especially invites the marginalized into His joy, but this invitation is universal, for all people. It is in this same spirit that we should welcome the first reading from the book of Proverbs.

Proverbs uses the image of a perfect wife to personify God's wisdom. In patristic writings, the Old Testament concept of wisdom is connected to the person of Christ. If we read Proverbs 31 in the light of this understanding, we can imagine our Lord Jesus Christ who comes to us every day in different forms. Just like lady wisdom in Proverbs, Jesus "works with loving hands". We even see his love for the poor reflected in lady wisdom as she "reaches out her hands to the poor and extends her arms to the needy". Proverbs reminds us that Jesus enlightens our lives and the lives of all the people who seek Him. He enables us to welcome Him when He comes to us.

In the second reading 1Thes 5:1-6, saint Paul invites us to stay alert and sober and not to sleep. He asks us to be vigilant and not let ourselves be absorbed by material concerns: our job, our studies, our food, our clothing, our appearance and so on and so forth. The way we can be vigilant is to develop our talents. To develop our talents, we can spend more time in prayer, reach out to those in need, be peacemakers, or give the gift of our time and presence. These are some small ways to work for the coming of the Kingdom of God.

As we consider how to remain vigilant, develop our talents and work for the coming of the Kingdom of God, Let us ask our Mother Mary and all the saints to intercede for us that we remain vigilant, develop our talents and work

for the coming of the Kingdom of God.





## NATIONAL BIBLE WEEK

National Bible Week is celebrated annual during Thanksgiving week, falling this year from November 19 — 25. It marks the anniversary of the promulgation of the *Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation* from the Second Vatican Council. In this document, the Church encourages the faithful to develop a "growing reverence for the word of God, which 'lasts forever'" (26).

A few ideas for celebrating the word of God this week include:

- Pray with the daily Mass readings. You can find them listed in this bulletin or at <a href="https://bible.usccb.org/">https://bible.usccb.org/</a>.
- Read and discuss your favorite Scripture passages. Invite children to share the Bible stories that they know. Explore what it is in the passage that speaks to you and/or your family.
- Practice *Lectio divina*, a prayer form in which you read, meditate, pray with, and contemplate a single Scripture passage. Read the same passage four times, entering into the passage and conversation with God more deeply with each reading.



If you have an individual retirement account and you are age 73 or older, you probably know that you must take your required minimum distribution (RMD) before the year ends.

However, did you know that you can fulfill all or part of your RMD and reduce your taxable income by transferring funds directly from your IRA to your parish or the Archdiocese of Chicago?

## National Black Catholic History Month

The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States voted on Tuesday, July 24, 1990 to designate November as Black Catholic History Month. November marks a time when the Church prays for all saints and souls in loving remembrance, as well as a time to recall the saints.

#### **Venerable Henriette Delille**

1812-November 17, 1862

Henriette Delille was born in 1812 in New Orleans, Louisiana, as a free woman of color. When she was 24, she experienced a religious conversion and proclaimed: "I believe in God. I hope in God. I love. I want to live and die for God."

Henriette eventually founded the Society of the Holy Family, responding to the need of treatment for the enslaved, elderly and sick, and care and education for the poor.

Henriette received tribute for her life's work in these words from her obituary: "[Henriette] devoted herself untiringly for many years, without reserve, to the religious instruction of the people of New Orleans, principally of slaves..." The last line of her obituary reads: "...for the love of Jesus Christ she had become the humble and devout servant of the slaves."

Archbishop Philip M. Hannan began the canonization process for Henriette DeLille in 1988. A special commission in Rome gave approval in 1988 after a review process. As of this time, an alleged miracle attributed to Henriette is being tried in a Catholic Tribunal, and the decree of judicial validity was issued in the investigation of her life, virtues, and reputation of sanctity. Henriette was declared Venerable by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010.

## National Black Catholic History Month

The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States voted on Tuesday, July 24, 1990 to designate November as Black Catholic History Month. November marks a time when the Church prays for all saints and souls in loving remembrance, as well as a time to recall the saints.

### Venerable Pierre Toussaint

June 27, 1776--June 30, 1853

Pierre was born in 1766 modern-day Haiti as a slave, but died in New York City as a free man and a well-known Catholic. Pierre Bérard, Toussaint's master, allowed him to be taught how to read and write by his grandmother. In his early 20s, Toussaint, his younger sister, his aunt, and two other house slaves accompanied their master's son to New York City because of political unrest at home. Apprenticed to a local hairdresser, Pierre learned the trade quickly and eventually worked in the homes of rich women in New York City.


When his master died, Toussaint supported his master's widow and the other slaves, himself, and was freed shortly before the widow's death in 1807. Four years later, he married Marie Rose Juliette, whose freedom he had purchased. They later adopted Euphémie, his orphaned niece. Both preceded him in death.

Even during his lifetime, Toussaint enjoyed the reputation of an exceptionally devout and charitable person within the Catholic community. Every day he attended the 6:00 a.m. Mass in St. Peter's Church, where he was a pewholder for many years. He also raised funds to build the original St. Patrick's Cathedral and St. Vincent de Paul Church.

Toussaint donated to various charities, generously assisting blacks and whites in need. He and his wife opened their home to orphans and educated them. The couple also nursed abandoned people who were suffering from yellow fever.

The late Cardinal Terence Cooke introduced Pierre's cause for canonization at the Vatican in 1968. On December 17, 1997, he was declared Venerable by Pope John Paul II.
