Like a fire burning within me (Jer. 20:9): Sent to Preach

Long before the process of synodality, the USCCB encouraged the full participation of the members of the parish in the process of homily preparation.

As the USCCB document, Fulfilled in Your Hearing: The Homily in the Sunday Assembly (1982) notes, "an effective way for preachers to be sure that they are addressing some of the real concerns of the congregation in the homily is to involve members of the congregation in a homily preparation group" (36).

The Bishops' document Preaching the Mystery of the Faith: The Sunday Homily (2012) states Fulfilled in Your Hearing is still valid (44). In fact, they write:

This defines the preacher's task: enabling the whole community and each individual believer to draw on the power of the Holy Spirit and to say with one's whole being, "Jesus is Lord," and to cry out to God, "Abba, Father!" (*Preaching the Mystery of the Faith*, 9)

Preaching is both a holy act and a communal one. The Code for Canon Law permits lay persons to preach in a church in certain circumstances where it may be advantageous (Canon 766).

The Charism of the Dominican Order

The passion for preaching forms the foundation of the Order of Preachers founded by Saint Dominic in 1215. He sent his young followers out to preach, just as Jesus had sent his disciples. The circumstances of Dominic's historical time were different from ours, and yet in some ways they are remarkably similar to ours.

Dominican theologian, Mary Catherine Hilkert, OP, observes:

Most of the people in our world who hunger for the good news of salvation or liberation are not to be found in our churches. If preaching is a matter of making connections, enabling people to hear the Gospel as good news for them, then the Gospel and its preachers have to meet people where they are.

This is the task of every preaching project today: to create ways for people to encounter the Gospel message wherever they are, so that it can help them shape lives that have personal and social integrity.

Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa

Saint Thomas the Apostle Parish and School has a very long history with Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa. The sisters founded the school in 1886 with Sister M. Gregory as Superior. Beginning in the church's basement, the school expanded to 100 children just two years later. By 1929, a new school building was dedicated to house an elementary school and a high school for girls. The Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa continued to serve in the school until the early 2000s.

Today, three Sinsinawa Dominicans continue the congregation's presence at St. Thomas the Apostle. Sister Elizabeth Pawlicki, O.P. (J.D., Master in Pastoral Studies) previously served on the school board and participated in the RCIA program. She is currently in congregational leadership. Sister Christin Tomy, O.P. is completing her Masters of Divinity and Masters of Arts in Theology at Catholic Theological Union. She has participated in the choir when classes allowed. Sister Laurie Brink, O.P. (Ph.D.) is professor of New Testament Studies at CTU. In the past, she has served as lector and worked with the RCIA program.

Inspired by Pope Francis' call for synodality and imbued with the charism of the order, these sisters will partner with Fr. Trail to offer reflections during on the Second Sunday of Avent at all of the Masses and on the Fourth Sunday of Advent at the 4 PM Mass on Saturday, December 23.





ADVENT: THE KINGDOM OF GOD: THE ESSENTIAL MESSAGE OF JESUS





Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

JESUS CHRIST is king of all creation. At the end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me" (28:18). The Book of Revelation calls him, "King of kings and Lord of lords" (19:16). People wanted to make Jesus a king after he worked the miracle of the loaves, but he went away by himself instead (John 6:15). They wanted a secular king to govern their land. Jesus wanted to rule their hearts.

The Catholic Church celebrates the kingship of Christ on the last Sunday of the Church year. The liturgical year reaches its climax in a celebration that honors the supreme command of Christ. He has dominion over all creation, and he rules every person who believes in him.

The Solemnity of Christ the King entered the Catholic calendar in 1925, which Pope Pius XI had set aside as a holy year. Pius thought the feast would bring the year to a solemn close, help combat the forces of secularism, and remind the world that Christ is its ultimate ruler. The pope chose the last Sunday of October because of its proximity to the end of the liturgical year and to serve as a prelude to All Saints Day on Nov. 1. The same day was already being observed as Reformation Sunday in the Protestant traditions.

Pope Paul VI moved the observance from the end of October to the very last Sunday of the Church year in order to exalt its theme even more. Now we end the year with an idea that sums up all that we have celebrated and that prepares us to start anew: this Jesus, whose birth we will soon celebrate, is the king of all creation.

POINSETTIAS FOR CHRISTMAS





NOVEMBER IS

National Black, Catholic History Month

The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States voted on Tuesday, July 24, 1990 to designate November as Black Catholic History Month. November marks a time when the Church prays for all saints and souls in loving remembrance, as well as a time to recall the saints.

Servant of God Julia Greeley

c. 1833-48-June 7, 1918

Denver's Angel of Charity was born into slavery at Hannibal, Missouri, between 1833 and 1848. As a young child, Julia's right eye was destroyed by a cruel slavemaster's whip.

Freed by the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, Julia subsequently earned her keep by serving white families in Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico—though mostly in the Denver area. She spent whatever she could spare to assist poor families in her neighborhood. When her own resources were inadequate, she begged for food, fuel, and clothing for the needy. To avoid embarrassing the people she helped, Julia did most of her charitable work under cover of night through dark alleys.

Julia entered the Catholic Church at Sacred Heart Parish in Denver in 1880. The Jesuits who ran the parish considered her the most enthusiastic promoter of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus they had ever seen. Every month she went on foot to every fire station in Denver and delivered literature of the Sacred Heart League to the firemen, Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

Julia had a rich devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Virgin. She was a daily communicant and continued her prayers while working and moving about. She joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1901 and was active in it until her death in 1918.

To the present day, many people have asked that her cause be opened for canonization. This request was finally granted in the Fall of 2016. As part of the Cause for Canonization, Julia's mortal remains were transferred to Denver's Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception on June 7, 2017.


