Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Thomas the Apostle,

One of the privileges of being the music minister at St. Thomas is being part of the St. Thomas Choir, a dedicated (and fun-loving) group of talented musicians. We gather most Wednesdays in the church for rehearsal, preparing music for weekend masses, which contribute to our liturgy shared together at St. Thomas each weekend.

As musicians, we are no strangers to the concept of preparation. In a way, our Wednesday rehearsals symbolize the struggles and joys of this concept: who wants to do something after the work day, in the evening, in the middle of the week, usually in the winter? The Wednesday rehearsal remains one of the many mysteries in my life, as my attitude before rehearsal is usually "do I really have to leave my home?" especially when compounded with rain or snow. But, the minute we gather together as a choir, the feeling immediately changes. Throughout our rehearsal and preparation, we take a pause from the busyness of life, work, and stress, and focus on our collective musical mission and our place as ministers in the Church. And, our post-rehearsal outings to Jimmy's never hurt, either.

As Fr. Trail mentioned in his homily last weekend, the season of Advent allows our parish to do the same thing—prepare and focus—in more ways than one. In our personal lives, we observe this season to prepare our hearts and minds for Christ's birth. As a parish, we symbolize this preparation in a variety of ways: the change in our music for mass, the new incense smell for Advent, and the beautiful wreath suspended at the entrance of the church.

Our Advent gathering hymn, spread across many verses, has a wealth of beautiful imagery:

As you sing the responses to this gathering hymn each week, listen to the words the cantor and choir sing. Use the text to prepare, in your own way, for our shared liturgy throughout the Advent season with intentionality and purpose.

FAMILY FAITH FORMATION MONTHLY THEME CONVERSING WITH GOD

The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines five forms of prayer, which we will explore over the next five weeks.

A Christmas on Monday

WHEN CHRISTMAS falls on a Monday, it causes temptation. In the Catholic Church, we begin celebrating Sundays and holydays on the previous evening. This practice stems from a custom that reckoned the start of the day at sunset. Saturday night Mass provides a convenience for individuals and families making alternative plans for Sunday morning, but it more deeply alerts us to the holiness of the most important day of the week.

Many families find Christmas Eve Mass an ideal way to begin observing this holyday. They gather for the Eucharist at church, then perhaps go home for a meal and exchange gifts. The next morning, their Christmas becomes a day of rest.

But when Christmas falls on a Monday, things get confusing. Two eves and two days intersect. Your parish will probably offer Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent on Saturday evening December 23 and Sunday morning December 24. Then on Sunday evening December 24, it will begin celebrating Christmas. That's a lot of church in 48 hours.

You may be tempted to skip a Mass either for the Fourth Sunday of Advent or for Christmas. You may be tempted to go to one Mass on December 24 and count it for both events. Advent is very short in such years, barely over three weeks, and it deserves our full attention. Christmas, of course, is one of the primary celebrations of the Church Year. These two distinctive liturgies draw us into the mystery of the Word Made Flesh.

Yes, it is extra effort to go to church twice during a busy interval of time, but there is no better way to prepare for and celebrate the reason for the season—the birth of Jesus Christ!
