

FROM THE Pastor's Desk

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Different ways of living out the Catholic faith, including different liturgical rites, should not be seen as threats to the unity of the Catholic Church but embraced as expressions of the body of Christ, Pope Francis said.

"You don't have to be afraid of the diversity of charisms in the church," the pope said in a video released Jan. 2, sharing his prayer intention for the month of January: "For the gift of diversity in the church" We are not all the same," he said, and Catholics should "rejoice in living this diversity."

Pope Francis recalled how in the first Christian communities, "diversity and unity were very present and in a tension that had to be resolved at a higher level." The pope also noted that "to move forward on the path of faith we also need ecumenical dialogue with brothers and sisters from other confessions and Christian communities." Dialogue, he said, is not "something that confuses or bothers, but a gift God gives to the Christian community so that it may grow as one body, the body of Christ."

Pope Francis pointed to Eastern Catholic churches, who, he said, "have their own traditions (and) some characteristic liturgical rites but maintain the unity of the faith. They reinforce it, they do not divide it." The two-minute video shows several scenes from Eastern Catholic liturgical celebrations, such as using a spoon to distribute Communion and giving a blessing with large liturgical candlesticks. Although they have their own liturgical and legal system, each Eastern church is considered fully equal in dignity to the Latin tradition within the Catholic Church.

The pope added that if the church lets itself be guided by the Holy Spirit, "richness, variety, diversity never provoke conflicts." The Holy Spirit, he said, "reminds us that before all we are children of God, all the same in the love of God and all different.



"Pope Francis ended the video asking people to pray to the Holy Spirit "so that it may help us recognize the gift of different charisms of Christian communities and to discover the wealth of different ritual traditions within the Catholic Church."

Song of Thanksgiving and Praise after Communion

During the six weeks of Winter Ordinary Time, you will notice a very slight change in the pattern of our Eucharistic celebration. Following the distribution of Holy Communion, before the Prayer after Communion, the whole assembly will be invited to stand and sing together a song of praise and/or thanksgiving.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal reminds us that after the reception of Holy Communion a period of silence is observed (no. 88). It also notes that instead of silence "a Psalm or other canticle of praise or a hymn may by sung by the whole congregation" (no. 88). This directive is reiterated in the US Bishops' document Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship (no. 196). Sing to the Lord says, "The song after Communion should focus the assembly on the mystery of the Holy Communion in which it participates . . . The congregation may stand for the song" [no. 196]. Notice, the Church's documents never talk about a so-called communion meditation done solely by cantor or choir; if there is a song, it is one of praise and/or thanksgiving and always sung by the whole congregation, those who have been made into the Body of Christ by their reception of Holy Communion. Fr. Paul Turner in At the Supper of the Lamb: A Pastoral and Theological Commentary on the Mass notes that "there is a record of a post-Communion song in the time of Sergius of Constantinople (+638):

Let this antiphon be sung: Let our mouth be filled with praise, Lord, that we may celebrate your glory, for you have graciously given us your holy mysteries. Keep us in holiness, meditating all day on your justice. Alleluia [*Chronicon Paschale*, PG 92:1001-1002; translation PT].

So, during this short beginning of Ordinary Time, we will employ this practice. Our voices united as one following communion will help us collectively offer our praise, adoration, and thanksgiving to God for the great gift of the Eucharist.

THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

"You shall love the Lord your God ... and YOUR NEIGHBOR AS YOURSELF" (LUKE 10: 27)

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, a joint endeavor between The Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity and the World Council of Churches, begins on January 18 and concludes on January 25, the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle.

First celebrated as the Church Unity Octave in 1908, this annual celebration invites Christians around the world to pray and work to fulfill the prayer of Jesus "that they all may be one" (John 17: 21). The Decree on Ecumenism from the Second Vatican Council notes that "every effort should be made toward the gradual realization of this unity, especially by prayer, and by fraternal dialogue" (18).

This year's theme invites Christians around the world to reflect on how we are united with our brothers and sisters by knowing of God's love for them and recognizing our common love for God in Christ. Drawn from the introductory verses to the Parable of the Good Samaritan, this invitation to consider love of God and love of neighbor as the greatest commandments challenges us to discover our neighbor and to respond with love, rather than fear, to those around us.






