

Sunday of the Word of God

In 2019, Pope Francis instituted the Sunday of the Word of God devoted to the celebration, study, and dissemination of the word of God and to be held on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. In his letter instituting Word of God Sunday, he wrote:

The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, much less a collection of books for the benefit of a privileged few. It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. At times, there can be a tendency to monopolize the sacred text by restricting it to certain circles or to select groups. It cannot be that way.

The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people." (*Aperuit Illis*, September 30, 2019, par. 4).

Pope Francis recognizes the treasure of our Scriptures. A treasure that belongs to all of us. As Catholics, we are called to read and to study the Bible mindful of its original historical, literary, and cultural context. We don't read the bible literally. That doesn't mean we don't believe that the bible is "true." All of Scripture bears witness to God's salvific action and does so accurately.

With the Vatican II document, *Dei verbum* (Word of God) promulgated in 1965 and the subsequent publications by the Pontifical Biblical Commission (PBC), we Catholics have been encouraged to explore for ourselves the treasures of God's word. No longer is the reading and study of Scripture solely a priority for the ordained.

As Stephen J. Binz writes, "The more God's people engage in prayerful and faith-filled reading of the Bible and thereby deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ, the more they are able to participate in the church's mission of evangelization. The more we become biblical Catholics, the more we will become evangelizing Catholics."

In our Catholic faith, we hold that the word of God is revealed in both Scripture and Tradition. Pope Francis reminds us:


We frequently risk separating sacred Scripture and sacred Tradition, without understanding that together they are the one source of Revelation. The written character of the former takes nothing away from its being fully a living word....Before becoming a written text, the word of God was handed down orally and kept alive by the faith of a people who, in the midst of many others, acknowledged it as their own history and the source of their identity. Biblical faith, then, is based on the living word, not on a book. (*Aperuit Illis*, par. 11).

With the institution of "Sunday of the Word of God," Pope Francis encourages us to dust off our family bible, open its pages (or scroll through the app!), and ponder the treasure we hold in our hands. But as the Letter of James reminds us, we are to be doers of the word, and not merely hears who deceive ourselves (James 1:22). Reading our Holy Scriptures is not a spectator's sport.

We need to be reminded, as the Pontifical Biblical Commission wrote in 1993:

"The aim is that the Word of God may become more and more the spiritual nourishment of the members of the People of God, the source for them of a life of faith, of hope and of love—and indeed a light for all humanity (cf. *Dei Verbum*, 21)."

This spiritual nourishment is not a dietary supplement, but a full course meal. And we are meant to ingest it. In prayer, in bible studies, in liturgy, in quiet moments in our day, we are to "taste and see the goodness of the Lord" (Psalm 34:8), and then share that goodness with others.

ORDINARY TIME: WINTER A Sense of the Season

What do the words Ordinary Time mean? Dorothy Day said, "The words 'Ordinary Time' in our prayer books put me in a state of confusion and irritation. To me, no time is ordinary." She was right. The Ordinary in Ordinary Time refers to ordinal—counted—time, not to a lack of something to celebrate. The Roman document, General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, says: "Apart from those seasons having their own distinctive character [Advent, Christmastime, Lent, Triduum and Eastertime], 33 or 34 weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects." (#43)

How do we celebrate "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects"? We gather every Sunday. Sunday is our original feast day. Christians have gathered every Sunday—the day of Christ's resurrection, the first day of the week—ever since there were Christians.

Each year there are two blocks of Ordinary Time, one in the winter between Christmastime and Lent, and the other in summer and fall, from Pentecost through Christ the King. When we gather on Sundays in Ordinary



Time, as always, we hear the scriptures proclaimed. We systematically read through the gospels. The first readings from the first testament of the Bible were chosen for their relationship to the gospel passages. The second readings come from the various letters of the second testament of the Bible. The mystery of Christ "in all its aspects" unfolds.

What is the heart of our Sunday celebration? We do our eucharist; that is, we do our thanksgiving. We praise and thank God for all creation; we pray for the whole world, as we remember Christ's life, death and resurrection. We share the bread and wine, the body and blood. We are sent forth to be the body and blood of Christ in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our towns, our cities, our country, our world.

"What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday is simultaneously a point of arrival and

departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is not ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living." (Saint Andrew Bible Missal [Brooklyn: William J. Hirten Co., 1982.])

PREPARING FOR EASTER

Each year, every church throughout the world purchases a new paschal candle, which is blessed and lit at the Easter Vigil. This candle, a symbol of the light of the risen Christ, is used throughout the Easter Season as a reminder of the great joy of the resurrection and the light of Christ we are to radiate. It is also used at baptisms to illuminate the light of Christ we receive in the waters of rebirth. Finally, it is lit at funerals and placed at the head of the casket or near the urn as a reminder of the light of Christ the deceased shared with the world.

This year, we'd like to purchase a beautifully handcrafted candle from Martin Marklin, whose lifework has been the promotion of the liturgical renewal, especially in fostering beauty, but we need your help. Martin sustainably raises bees on his Vermont farm with his family and carefully harvests the beeswax and honey to create these original handmade candles and nourish his customers.



ART AND ARCHITECTURE OF ST. THOMAS THE APOSTLE

As we prepare for the 100th anniversary of the dedication of our church this October, we pause this month reflect on the beauty of our space and the way it invites us to worship God.

"The term *church* ... has been used to describe 'the building in which the Christian community gathers to hear the word of God, to pray together, to receive the sacraments, and celebrate the eucharist.' That building is both the house of God on earth (*domus Dei*) and a house fit for the prayers of the saints (*domus ecclesiae*). Such a house of prayer must be expressive of the presence of God and suited for the celebration of the sacrifice of Christ, as well as reflective of the community that celebrates there" (*Built of Living Stones*, 16).

Conversion of St. Paul

THE CONVERSION of St. Paul is one of the Bible's great stories. A man who persecuted Christians joins the group he was targeting. The story appears several times in the New Testament. Saul was traveling on the road to Damascus when he was struck by a blinding light and fell to the ground. Unable to see, he heard the voice of Jesus ask, "Why do you persecute me?" (Acts 9:4). Saul in turn asked, "Who are you, Lord?" (Acts 9:5). Housed by a disciple named Ananias, Saul learned about Jesus Christ, was baptized, and became known as "Paul." Through his travels, preaching, and writing, he became the most influential of all the followers of Christ. The conversation during his vision symbolizes the stance between God and the average human person: God asks why we do what we do, and we try to penetrate the mystery of God.

The Catholic Church celebrates a feast day in honor of Paul's conversion every year on January 25. There is no historical evidence linking this date to that event. The earliest appearance of January 25 on the Church calendar seems to have commemorated the anniversary of the day that the relics of this apostle were moved from the catacombs to the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls of Rome. The date later became associated with his conversion, probably because of the universal appeal of Paul's story.






