FROM Principal Koll

Hi, my name is Ken Koll and I serve as Principal of St. Thomas the Apostle School. I have worked in Catholic Schools for 30 years and attended Catholic Schools including college and graduate school. Today, we begin "Catholic Schools Week." I'd like to share some thoughts with you about Catholic education and our school in particular. People often ask me why they should choose Catholic School. After all, 1+1=2 no

matter what school helps you learn addition. As an answer to that question, I'd like to share a few of my personal experiences of Catholic Education.

I vividly remember my kindergarten teacher greeting each student at the classroom door every day with a big hug and smile as she blessed our foreheads. The uniform for boys was white dress shirts (whose idea was that?) and blue dress pants. We wore red ties until 7th grade and had the honor of wearing black ties in 8th grade. I remember hearing over the PA that President Kennedy was shot, and the entire school going to the Church to pray. The smell after a candle is extinguished, still brings me back to my days as an altar server extinguishing candles after evening Mass. As a teenager, I joined "The New Group." The name wasn't much but I was happy that our Parish created amazing opportunities to help us feel that we belonged.

I attended DePaul University whose motto translated from Latin means "I will show you the ways of wisdom," That motto and Vincentian values truly influenced every corner of my college education. I will never forget our wedding Mass, which lasted longer than expected. When we turned around, the Church was packed - mostly with students I taught and people who were there for the 4:30 Mass! The Church rocked with the vibrant applause. Seeing all three of our sons choose Catholic Universities and professions rooted in service is an enormous source of pride.



This is intended as more than a trip down memory lane. I share these

memories to tell you that Catholic education and Catholic values have permeated every part of my life and helped shape the person I have become. It has helped me think and live differently. Being a part of a faith community gave me a home that has welcomed me, encouraged me and challenged me. It has helped me try to make sense of a world that at times hasn't made any sense at all. And it has definitely inspired me to be unafraid to ask hard questions and work diligently for what is right.

At St. Thomas the Apostle, I have again found a welcoming community of dedicated people committed to educating the children not only academically but spiritually as well. This year marks the 50th anniversary of Catholic School Week which is a national initiative to celebrate Catholic Schools. I think that's a big deal because it helps us realize that we are a part of something bigger. We are connected and united in our efforts to see education as a mission. We are cultivating leaders with knowledge, faith, and values that can transform our world.

I'd like to invite you to our Open House on January 28th starting right after 10:00 Mass and concluding at 1:00.

Any baptized Catholic, over the age of seven, may receive the sacrament if he or she has reasonably judged the seriousness of the illness and remains free of serious sin.

PREPARING FOR EASTER

Each year, every church throughout the world purchases a new paschal candle, which is blessed and lit at the Easter Vigil. This candle, a symbol of the light of the risen Christ, is used throughout the Easter Season as a reminder of the great joy of the resurrection and the light of Christ we are to radiate. It is also used at baptisms to illuminate the light of Christ we receive in the waters of rebirth. Finally, it is lit at funerals and placed at the head of the casket or near the urn as a reminder of the light of Christ the deceased shared with the world.

This year, we'd like to purchase a beautifully handcrafted candle from <u>Martin Marklin</u>, whose lifework has been the promotion of the liturgical renewal, especially in fostering beauty, but we need your help. Martin sustainably raises bees on his Vermont farm with his family and carefully harvests the beeswax and honey to create these original handmade candles and nourish his customers.

Presentation of the Lord

THE PRESENTATION of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas, and church. The Mass of February 2 begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus.

The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the fortieth day after childbirth, parents brought the infant to the Temple to present him/her to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up forty days after Christmas, and you'll come to February 2. Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to the entire world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end

Faith

As we prepare for the 100th anniversary of the dedication of our church this October, we pause this month reflect on the beauty of our space and the way it invites us to worship God.

Along both sides of the nave, light enters the Church through sixteen stained glass windows, which are the only ones in Chicago designed by Valentine d'Ogries. These windows depict the Early Church Fathers. Eight Greek (Eastern) fathers are located on the left, while eight Latin (Western) fathers are on the right, when one faces the altar. The windows also include alternating narrative scenes and pairs of standing

the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of Ordinary Time. Since it is a feast of the Lord, it takes precedence even when it falls on Sunday.

The candles you hold for the blessing may come from your parish, or you may bring your own from home. If you like to use blessed candles for household prayer throughout the year, here is your chance to get them. On the day following this feast, our calendar permits the option of commemorating St. Blase, a bishop and martyr of the early Church. Legend has it that he once freed a child from choking, and while imprisoned under persecution he received light from friends who visited his cell with candles. Our Church still uses candles from the Presentation of the Lord in the blessing of the faithful's throats on St. Blase's Day. Blessed candles in our churches and homes signify the living presence of Christ in our community. With Christ as our light we warm a lost and wintry world.


