Dear friends in Music,

The last time I wrote to you, we were in the midst of the Advent season preparing for Christmas. I hope it was a time of rest and joy for you, your family and friends, and all those important in your life.

For those still seeking a new resolution or activity in this new year, I warmly welcome you to join my favorite ministry at our parish, the St. Thomas the Apostle Choir. We are a fun-loving, warmth-filled group that meets each Wednesday. While music and rehearsal is our focus, fellowship and fun is our passion—you'll often find us at Jimmy's after rehearsal. And, as we approach the Lenten season, there will be a variety of opportunities to sing together at, including prayer services, Sunday masses, and, of course, Triduum.

"Why can't I hear the cantor?" is a question that I'm asked frequently by parishioners and visitors. As a kid, relying on a cantor to sing every hymn and song on the microphone was something I was accustomed to, and I imagine that experience is more or less familiar for many of us in this congregation.

Part of the philosophy I share with Fr. Trail and Timothy Johnston, our Pastoral Associate, is that the congregation is the leader of sung prayer in the Church, not the cantor—that congregational singing is of the utmost importance. And, the teachings of the Church back this: "The full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else, for it is the primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit." (Sacrosanctum Concilium, no. 14)

At St. Thomas the Apostle, the role of our cantors is to help guide the assembly and reassure them; they are a visual representation, raising their arms to let you know that it's *now time to sing*—but, most critically, they do not sing *at* the congregation. You'll notice this especially during the Gathering, Preparation of the Gifts, and Song of Praise and/or Recessional Hymns, where the cantor doesn't use the microphone at all. At other points during the mass, you'll notice the cantor utilize the microphone—the Responsorial Psalm, Gospel Acclamation, and Communion Hymn. At these points, it's necessary to have the cantor sing the verses of the psalm, intone the gospel acclamation, and provide assembly support during the communion procession.

Our congregation has a powerful voice, and it's incredible to hear the whole church singing from my perspective at the very front of the church! I would love to hear your thoughts and suggestions on our music at St. Thomas the Apostle—you are always welcome to write to me at mmerz@stapostleparish.org.

Worship

SAINT BLASE BLESSING

February 3



Sickness and suffering are mysteries that confront most Christians at some time in their lives. Believers cherish the stories of Jesus' tender concern for the poor and sick who sought to find relief and meaning in their struggles. The flesh-and-blood example of a long line of Christian witnesses whose faith sustained them in time of trial offers us hope when shadows darken our lives. Saint Blase was such a person.

Blase served as bishop of Armenia in the fourth century. Little is known about his life, but tradition tells us that he saved a small boy from choking on a fish bone. Because of this, his help is sought for those who are sick, especially those who are afflicted with illnesses of the throat. On February 3, the feast of Saint Blase, the church continues its ministry to the sick with the blessing of throats.

This blessing, which can take place either after the homily at Mass or as part of a liturgy of the word, invokes God's healing and protection. Two blessed candles, joined in the form of a cross, are placed around the throat of each person seeking a blessing. The minister then prays, "Through the intercession of Saint Blase, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the

throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Humbled by physical weakness and human limitations, we acknowledge our faith in God's protective love for all who call upon God's name.

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Always Thanksgiving

The liturgy of the eucharist refers to the part of the Mass that begins with the collection and the preparation of the altar and the gifts of bread and wine. What are we doing in these actions? Much of the answer lies in the word eucharist. Derived from a Greek word, it means "thanksgiving."

The eucharistic prayer, beginning with "The Lord be with you. And also with you. Lift up your hearts...," and ending with the Great Amen, is the central part of the Mass. It is proclaimed over bread and wine, the basic signs of life and death, food and drink from the tables of ordinary people. We praise God for creation. We give God thanks and praise for Jesus, and for Jesus' saving deeds. We ask God that the abundance promised at this holy table may be shared with the whole world, with all who seek God, even with the dead.

The eucharistic prayer—although said aloud only by the priest—is not "the priest's prayer." The entire prayer requires every baptized person's full, conscious and active participation. That does not mean that everyone reads the words aloud—that wouldn't work! Rather, it means that we must join our hearts to the words sung or spoken by the priest, that we must assume an attentive posture, put aside the missalette and sing our parts with gusto and sincerity.

In the end, eucharist is what our life as Christians is all about. In suffering or in joy, in confusion or routine, our life is always to be praise, always to be thanksgiving, always to be a sharing of God's abundance with those in need.

PREPARING FOR EASTER

Each year, every church throughout the world purchases a new paschal candle, which is blessed and lit at the Easter Vigil. This candle, a symbol of the light of the risen Christ, is used throughout the Easter Season as a reminder of the great joy of the resurrection and the light of Christ we are to radiate. It is also used at baptisms to illuminate the light of Christ we receive in the waters of rebirth. Finally, it is lit at funerals and placed at the head of the casket or near the urn as a reminder of the light of Christ the deceased shared with the world.

This year, we'd like to purchase a beautifully handcrafted candle from Martin Marklin, whose lifework has been the promotion of the liturgical renewal, especially in fostering beauty, but we need your help. Martin sustainably raises bees on his Vermont farm with his family and carefully harvests the beeswax and honey to create these original handmade candles and nourish his customers.

FAMILY FAITH FORMATION MONTHLY THEME ART AND ARCHITECTURE OF St. THOMAS THE APOSTLE

As we prepare for the 100th anniversary of the dedication of our church this October, we pause this month reflect on the beauty of our space and the way it invites us to worship God.

Tucked in the alcove next to the St. Joseph Chapel and the organ console is a memorial to the parishioners of St. Thomas the Apostle who died in both World War I and World War II. These memorials are arranged on and adjacent to the Pietà by Alfeo Faggi. Unlike other renditions of the Pietà, this rendition has Jesus situated in the same position as Mary, so that "seated in her lap, his body seems to merge with hers."*

This week, take time to examine this statue and pray for all men and women who have given their lives in service to our country, particularly those from our St.. Thomas the Apostle family.

The Priesthood of the Faithful

Mass depends on the participation of the priesthood of the faithful, according to the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (5). "The celebration of the Eucharist is the action of the whole Church." Baptized Christians share in the royal priesthood of God's people. Everyone offers a spiritual sacrifice together with the priest in union with Christ.

"For this people is the People of God, purchased by Christ's Blood, gathered together by the Lord, nourished by his word" (ibid.). When we assemble at church, we come as God's own, a people loved so much that Christ shed blood for us. We gather as people of faith, as people God loves. We listen to God's Word—food for this chosen people.

This people is "called to present to God the prayers of the entire human family" (ibid.). We partake in the General Intercessions, or the Universal Prayer.

We are "a people that gives thanks in Christ for the mystery of salvation by offering his Sacrifice" (ibid.). The priest does not offer this sacrifice alone. All of us do. We all give thanks. Scratch the skin of any Christian and you should find thanksgiving in the blood. We offer the Eucharistic Sacrifice with the priest, giving thanks.

Finally, it is a people "that is brought together in unity by Communion in the Body and Blood of Christ" (ibid.). God's priestly people reach perfection in Communion.

"This people, though holy in its origin, nevertheless grows constantly in holiness by conscious, active, and fruitful participation in the mystery of the Eucharist" (ibid.). When we gather for Mass, we do not merely watch. We do not merely read along. We participate actively and consciously in the mystery around us. And we grow in holiness.






