

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Thomas the Apostle,

It has come to my attention that some parishioners have been inquiring amongst themselves about the parish's response to the migrant crisis here in Chicago and more specifically in Hyde Park. As you recall back in November we held a coat drive for our neighbors in need with great success. Even now we continue to give out coats and other clothing that was donated by you.

Word has gotten around the neighborhood and the parish office gets visits from new arrivals almost weekly who need clothing and basics like socks and underwear as they transition to their new life in Chicago.

As I mentioned to you back in November, I understand this is a very real situation that requires a real response on our part but I'm also mindful of the political complexity around this issue. No matter one's stance on the issue it does not negate our responsibility to do the right thing based on our Catholic faith and the mandate of the Gospel.

I realize that after the coat drive in November things seemed quiet. I can appreciate and understand the grumblings of the community to continue to bring this real issue to the forefront so that we as a church can address it as we are called to do. Part of the reason for my silence after the coat drive was to put our energy and focus on helping a particular family find a place to live.

Over the past few months, with the help of dedicated parishioners and our partnership with Catholic Charities, we have been able to secure a grant of \$10,000 and we have partnered with the Hyde Park Kenwood Refugee Project to house a Venezuelan family here in our neighborhood for one year. This has been months in the making and I'm happy to share with you that they were able to move into their apartment this past Wednesday.

This past Monday the family came to the rectory and took some furniture out of my home for them to be able to furnish their new home. I found myself being very moved by the experience because, for them, this is a new beginning, a new chapter in their lives, and the beginning of their story here in the United States. I couldn't help but think about my own grandparents, Brigido and Eugenia Rodriguez, who moved to the United States from Puerto Rico in the 1940s not knowing anyone here but had a desire to start a new and better life for them and for their family to come.

Part of the reason for my silence in addition to putting our energy and focus into this important cause was also, and if I can be frank with you, I didn't want to get anyone's hopes up if something went south. As you all know real estate is at a premium here in Hyde Park and our parishioners who worked on this project looked at over a dozen apartments and more than a few fell through due to leasing issues, plumbing issues, or other barriers that kept coming up preventing us from being able to sign a lease for this family.



There were hundreds of emails back and forth to coordinate this effort and so many times we were almost there but something fell short. Every time that email came through when it didn't work out felt like a punch in the gut and it felt like two steps forward and three steps back in the process.

But this story ends on a very positive note.

The family of three: Juan, Rosemary, and their teenage daughter who attends high school in the neighborhood now have a home of their own.

This is one small drop in the bucket of a very large political issue. I realize that there will be challenges ahead going forward and I know that while we didn't fix the entire system that is broken at least we made a difference in the life of a family.

Part of my writing to you this weekend is not to celebrate our successes or to make "an ask, just simply let you know that your fellow parishioners came together and made a difference in the life of a family. That is the blessing of Saint Thomas: we are a community that cares for one another and supports one another.

I am grateful for those who stepped up and who worked to make this possible. One person I wish to mention specifically has returned to God. Dr. Sarah Wright, who recently passed away, was instrumental in getting this off the ground and worked tirelessly Until she went to the hospital to keep the momentum going forward. She, along with her fellow parishioners, did the intense but very quiet work of coordinating this effort and I am sure that she is very pleased with the results of our labors.

We continue to do the good work each and every day that God has called us all to do.

In all things may God bless our parish.

A Reconciling Love

Loving Father, you sent your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, to reconcile the world to you. Grant that our hearts may be open to your revelation in the Eucharist and in the Word. May your Spirit enliven us that we may spread our faith to all we encounter. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, April 14, 2024 Without Fear

Today's readings: Acts 3:13–15, 17–19; Psalm 4:2, 4, 7–8, 9 (7a); 1 John 2:1–5a; Luke 24:35–48. "Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures," we hear in today's Gospel. Our lives are sometimes filled with so much noise that our Lord's voice gets lost amid the cacophony. If time in silence with God is carved into our day, we can discern what God is saying to us in Scripture. But being still in a quiet place can be daunting. Begin the practice by sitting in the quiet one minute a day until that minute passes quickly. On subsequent days, increase the time to two, three, and four minutes until you are able to sit for twenty minutes with God.

In that silence, open yourself to be vulnerable to God. Doing so might seem daunting so begin by reading a verse from Scripture, saying a short prayer, or speaking to God just as you would speak to a friend. Tell God what makes you doubt in his promise. There is no need to fear such a conversation with God, for he wants a deeper relationship with you. Just as he met the startled and terrified disciples where they were in their faith, so he will meet you.

"Peace be with you," Jesus says to the disciples in today's Gospel. He wants peace for you also. In the silence, Christ awaits your invitation to open your mind to the Scriptures. He, too, awaits your response as a witness to the mercy and forgiveness he offers all who believe. In accepting the peace that Christ offers, consider who in your life needs you to offer them mercy.





THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 15 Bread of Life

Jesus says to his disciples, "You are looking for me not because you saw signs but because you ate the loaves and were filled." Jesus is the Bread of Life; he gave himself to us in the Last Supper and continues to do so at each Eucharist. Some people continue to go spiritually hungry because they do not avail themselves of the nourishment Christ offers. As you begin your week, ask God to work through you to continue building the kingdom. *Today's readings: Acts* 6:8–15; Psalm 119:23–24, 26–27, 29–30; John 6:22–29.

Tuesday, April 16 Never Hunger

People are always looking for signs. Despite all the times Jesus performed miracles, healed people, and cast out demons, some in today's Gospel continue to doubt the power of God. People either believe because they have seen or because they have been healed. When asked to be given the bread of life, Jesus responded, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger." As you receive the Eucharist every week, meditate on what It means for Christ to be the Bread of Life. How is he sustenance for you? *Today's readings: Acts 7:51—8:1a; Psalm 31:3cd–4, 6, 7b, 8a, 17, 21ab; John 6:30–35.*

Wednesday, April 17 Visible Signs

"I came down from heaven not to do my own will but the will of the one who sent me." With those words in today's Gospel, Jesus reveals that he has submitted his life to God. The first reading, from Acts, shows how such submission cost St. Stephen his life. But as Philip proclaimed the Messiah to Samaria, "there was great joy in that city." Do you understand that you have a responsibility to bring the joy of the Gospel to those you meet? *Today's readings: Acts* 8:1b-8; Psalm 66:1-3a, 4-5, 6-7a; John 6:35-40.

Thursday, April 18 We Believe

Today's Gospel encourages us to ponder the mystery of the Trinity. The reading tells us that no one has seen the Father "but the one who is from God." Each Sunday at Mass, the faithful profess in the creed that Jesus is consubstantial with the Father. Pray with either the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed, taking time to realize what the words and our beliefs about the Trinity mean. *Today's readings: Acts* 8:26–40; *Psalm* 66:8–9, 16–17, 20; John 6:44–51.

Friday, April 19 New Lives

Saul's plans—to bring back in chains anyone who followed the Way—were upended when Jesus asked, "Why are you persecuting me?" Soon, Saul was seeking baptism and proclaiming the Good News. Sudden changes often bring people to reconsider their priorities. A dramatic example of that occurred during the lockdowns of the COVID-19 pandemic. Do you need to reexamine your values and determine whether they are aligned with how God is calling you? *Today's readings: Acts 9:1–20; Psalm 117:1bc, 2; John 6:52–59.*

Saturday, April 20 Be Salt!

In today's Gospel from John, we hear that many disciples "returned to their former way of life." That image of people going back to their old ways is contrasted with Peter's declaration of allegiance and the growth of the Church recorded in Acts. When we give in to temptation and return to former ways, we may experience momentary happiness but miss out on the peace that Christ offers. The reading from Acts tells of the peace in the Church as it was being built up. Where do you notice peace today? *Today's readings: Acts 9:31–42; Psalm 116:12–13, 14–15, 16–17; John 6:60–69.*


