



uring the Easter Season, our First Reading is always taken from the Acts of the Apostles, rather than the Old Testament. The Church offers us the wisdom of the life of the early Church as our guide for how we are to live our life in community and bear witness to the Good News.

Last week, on the Third Sunday of Easter, we heard Peter speaking to the crowds gathered in the Temple area after healing a crippled man who sat at the Beautiful Gate of the Temple. He testified to the resurrection and called for repentance and conversion. In

today's reading, we see that Peter has been arrested and brought before the Sanhedrin. Even in this moment. Peter asserts the Good News and proclaims that "it was in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazorean ... [that] this man stands before you healed, [and] ... there is no salvation through anyone else" (Acts 4:10,12). Peter gives a beautiful

testimony and witness of faith.

We are called to be like Peter, sharing the message of Christ's resurrection to the world. In order to share the message, we must first know it and embrace it in our life. This means making our faith a priority in our life and living our baptismal call to be priest, prophet, and king. At St. Thomas the Apostle, we have many opportunities to deepen and rejoice in our faith. We have opportunities to serve and to witness the message of the Gospel.

For families with children, our Family and

Preschool Family Faith Formation processes offer a space to experience the love of God by engaging in activities to come to know the teachings, rituals, and prayers of the Church and to grow in community. Our immediate preparation processes for baptism, reconciliation, confirmation, and eucharist invite parents and children to hear the Good News and share a response in faith as they prepare to receive the sacraments of the Church for themselves or their children. In the Christian initiation process, those who are unbaptized or baptized in another Christian tradition are accompanied in faith by this community to the sacraments. For adults, we periodically offer Bible Study and retreats. In addition, our St. Thomas website offers links and resources to articles, books, videos, and other opportunities to grow in faith.

Once we have heard the Gospel, we are compelled to put our faith into action and live it. We do this both on the St. Thomas campus and in our daily activities. While on-campus, you are living your faith by greeting or exchanging smiles with those in the pew near you, engaging in conversation during after-Mass hospitality on Sundays or on the lawn as you exit the building. There are even opportunities to serve—in a liturgical ministry, as a member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, through the Knights of Columbus, and our St. Thomas the Apostle school community. Our upcoming Centennial Building Ball is an time for us to rejoice in the many works of our parish community over the years and the beautiful space in which we are able to worship. We also witness our faith off-campus, when we live our values and bear Christ to the world.

As we continue to journey through the Easter season, take this time to reflect on your involvement with our St. Thomas community. Are you called to grow your faith, prepare to receive a sacrament, serve in a liturgical ministry, attend our Centennial Building Ball? In what way will you witness your faith and the love of God to the world around you?

Q What's next? Is it over now? Does Christian initiation ever end?

A tits heart, Christian initiation is about conversion—people turning toward God for the first time. But that movement of turning toward God continues after initiation. Disciples continue to turn more and more deeply toward God throughout their lives. That is why the privilege of accompanying seekers as they come to know Jesus Christ is so compelling and revitalizing for the baptized. We are always engaged in that movement of turning, of ongoing conversion.

The ninety-some days from Ash Wednesday to Pentecost, from death to new life, are at the heart of Christian life and are an especially fertile time for ongoing conversion. The assembly makes this journey together each year with those who are coming to faith. Beginning in Lent, the paths of the elect and the assembly gradually grow

closer until at Easter neophytes and assembly are at last one in Baptism and share Eucharist together at the Lord's Table. At the Easter Vigil, the baptized attend closely as the elect are called by name, rise from the font, and are told they are "a new creation." We watch as they are given a lighted candle, told



they have been enlightened by Christ, and reminded to walk as children of the light. These words take on a new meaning as the assembly hears them spoken to these adults. We see ourselves in the newly baptized. We recommit to bringing our baptismal garment unstained to Christ, to walking as children of light. We voice this recommitment by renewing our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with baptismal water. These days renew us in our baptismal identity, calling us to share the light of Christ in all the dark corners of our world.

Mystagogy during the fifty days of Easter is a school for Christian living—a school for neophytes and for all the

assembly. And it was a school through which Jesus' first disciples also learned. For forty days after he rose from the dead, the Risen Lord stayed with his disciples, opening the Scriptures for them, sharing meals with them, and assuring them of his everlasting presence. He commissioned them as Apostles and ascended, ten days later sending the Holy Spirit among them. The seven Sunday Masses of Easter Time echo that savoring, teaching, understanding, and commissioning.

Worship

After Pentecost, our daily living goes on, nourished by this journey. Whether neophyte or long-baptized, we will experience joys and sorrows in our lives ahead. We will stumble and rise, we will fall short of the baptismal life to which we are called. Yet the Risen Christ accompanies us, and we accompany one another, turning together toward the world still in need of Christ's light.

At every moment in the world, God is loving and leading people. Grace is flowing, hearts are stirring, and people are seeking. That is how initiation begins—with God's action—and disciples are needed to respond by being and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. We do this simply by living our lives as faithful disciples, and we do not hesitate to give a reason for our hope when people want to talk—to share our joys and struggles as followers of Jesus Christ. We may never know the impact of our efforts to be a sign of encouragement, or we may have the joy of knowing that we helped to move someone along in their journey. Soon we will begin this initiation process again, with new experiences and with new seekers who will become new Christians. The Church's work of initiation never ends.



FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Our Shepherd

God the Father, you are our shepherd, who offer us green pastures, and life-giving water. Through love and kindness, you lead your flock to a restful place. With your tender touch, you cast away our fears. There is nothing we want but to remain by your side. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Sunday, April 21, 2024 The Good Shepherd

Today's readings: Acts 4:8–12; *Psalm* 118:1, 8–9, 21–23, 26, 28, 29; 1 John 3:1–2; John 10:11–18. When you see the Good Shepherd depicted in art, do you see yourself as the lamb? Do you see yourself as one to be protected, guided, and comforted? Or do you think the lamb reflects only a child? Imagining yourself as the lamb will provide insight into who God is for you. "I am the Good Shepherd, and I know mine, and mine know me," Jesus says. This portrayal reveals the intimacy of our relationship with God. God knows us and has given us the capacity to know him.

The shepherd is willing to lay down his life for his sheep. The Good Shepherd has already done this for us, dying on the cross so that we may have eternal life. A hired hand, however, does not have this connection to the sheep; he would not sacrifice his life for the flock. This man "sees a wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away."

Our Shepherd is with us—in our loneliness and sorrow as well as in our joy. Spend a few minutes in quiet, imagining yourself with the Good Shepherd in a green pasture. Let him hear not only your voice but your deepest desires. Seek to expand your quiet prayer time this week so that you might hear the Good Shepherd's voice. Remember your relationship with the Good Shepherd grows as you make space for him in your life.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 22 In Silence

"The sheep follow him because they recognize his voice." The Gospel of John portrays the Lord as intimately connected to his followers. They know his voice, and he has come so that "they might have life and have it more abundantly." Only by pausing our busy lives can we hear God's voice. Consider where you might have even a few minutes in a day to listen to God. *Today's readings: Acts 11:1–18; Psalm 42:2–3; 43:3, 4; John 10:1–10.*

Tuesday, April 23 Listen

In today's Gospel, we hear that people continue to badger Jesus to prove he is indeed the Son of God. "How long are you going to keep us in suspense? If you are the Christ, tell us plainly," they say. These people are among those who do not recognize the shepherd's voice. Once the sheep are in the flock, Jesus says, "No one can take them [sheep] out of the Father's hands. The Father and I are one." In coming chapters of the Gospel of John, we will hear Jesus yearn for that same unity with humankind. *Today's readings: Acts 11:19–26; Psalm 87:1b–3, 4–5, 6–7; John 10:22–30.*

Wednesday, April 24 Obeying the Spirit

Today's account from Acts shows Barnabas and Saul sailing to Cyprus to spread the Good News. They wasted no time in responding to the Holy Spirit, who told the community, "Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them." How does your community help people discern their gifts and their mission in the Church? Is there anyone you can meet with in your parish to help you discern your calling to serve the Church and the world? *Today's readings: Acts 12:24—13:5a; Psalm 67:2–3, 5, 6, 8; John 12:44–50.*

Thursday, April 25 Feast of St. Mark

On the Feast of St. Mark, Evangelist, we hear in the Gospel, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature." St. Mark is believed to be the disciple referred to in Acts as "John who is called Mark" (12:25). He was the son of Mary of Jerusalem, who opened her home to the disciples. It is believed that he met Peter, Paul, and other disciples in his mother's home and then joined them in evangelizing. *Today's readings: 1 Peter 5:5b–14; Psalm 89:2–3, 6–7, 16–17; Mark 16:15–20.*

Friday, April 26 Always Loving

With Thomas voicing confusion, Jesus lovingly replies, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." Thomas had followed Jesus for years and still questioned where the Lord was leading the disciples. Believers live with questions. Whether your faith is new or lifelong, you may at times be unsure of the spiritual path you are to follow. Jesus offers assurance that he is not only the way but the truth and the life. *Today's readings:* Acts 13:26–33; Psalm 2:6–7, 8–9, 10–11ab; John 14:1–6.

Saturday, April 27 In Silence

"Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us," Philip tells Jesus. There is a Philip in all of us, looking for reassurance of the presence of God in our lives. Sometimes we ask God for a sign to calm our fears. Jesus directs Philip and us to look not only to his words but his works. Where do you see the work of God in your community? Is there someone who needs reassurance that God is present during struggles? *Today's readings: Acts 13:44–52; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 14:7–14.*
