

Sunday, May 12, 2024 Never Alone



Today's readings: Acts 1:1–11; Psalm 47:2–3, 6–7, 8–9 (6); Ephesians 1:17–23 or Ephesians 4:1–3 or 4:1–7, 11–13; Mark 16:15–20. On Jesus' final day on earth, the disciples might be expected to be sad. They also might be confused about what will occur. Jesus did not attempt to clear their confusion; his intent was to set them on their mission. To the disciples' concern over whether Jesus would restore the kingdom of Israel, he replies, "It is not for you to know. . . . You will be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth." Still, they needed to be stirred to action by the angels who asks, "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?"

The Gospel depicts the disciples as being more confident. After hearing that they are to "go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel," the disciples went forth and preached everywhere." In the reading from Ephesians, we hear that the holy ones will be equipped "for the building up of the body of Christ." By our baptism, we have been given a responsibility to continue the building up of the kingdom of God on earth. This week reflect on your role in spreading the Gospel. Are there ways that your parish can help equip you for the mission that is yours? Consider joining a faith formation session or a Bible study group.

THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, May 13 Do Not Despair

As we begin this last week of Easter, allow Jesus' words in today's Gospel to echo in your heart: "In the world you will have trouble, but take courage, I have conquered the world." It is easy to say not to be afraid, but that is part of human nature. If we truly trust in God, however, fear should not paralyze us. God is with us. Pray for the spirit to illuminate your heart and fill you with courage in your faith journey. Today's readings: Acts 19:1–8; Psalm 68:2–3ab, 4–5acd, 6–7ab; John 16:29–33.

Tuesday, May 14Continuing the Ministry

"No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends," Jesus tells his disciples in today's Gospel. The depth of God's love that is revealed in Jesus' suffering and death is a model for the love that Christ's followers should exhibit. Examine your sensitivity to the needs of others. Are you willing to reach out, or have you noticed that you are less sensitive to another's suffering? As we become bearers of the message of Christ, may we be living testimony for the world. *Today's readings: Acts 1:15–17, 20–26; Psalm 113:1–2, 3–4, 5–6, 7–8; John 15:9–17.*

Wednesday, May 15 Beware of the Wolves

As Paul prepares the Church at Ephesus for his leaving, he warns the presbyters that wolves will come "to draw the disciples away." This concern that we hear in today's reading from Acts continues today. Wolves can come in the form of false messiahs or as distractions. Consider the attention that you give to obtaining the latest gadgets or fashionable apparel. Who or what distracts you from the life God has called you to? Pray to God to keep distractions from disturbing your focus. *Today's readings: Acts 20:28–38; Psalm 68:29–30, 33–35a, 35bc–36ab; John 17:11b–19.*

Thursday, May 16

Go to Rome

Jesus had shown the disciples that there would be consequences to following him. In Acts today, we read that Paul, who had persecuted Christians before his conversion, is being persecuted for his testimony. The imprisoned Paul does not protest when the Lord tells the disciple that he will continue to bear witness in Rome. Spreading the Gospel sometimes requires leaving our comfort zones. God might call us to unexpected people and places. *Today's readings: Acts* 22:30, 23:6–11; Psalm 16:1–2a, 5, 7–8, 9–10,11; John 17:20–26.

Friday, May 17 Do You Love Me?

Simon Peter is all of us. How many times have you sinned or walked away from God and returned truly sorry? In the hours before Jesus was crucified, Peter denied our Lord three times. Still, Jesus sought out Peter to ask, "Do you love me?" and to give him the responsibility to "feed my sheep." Can you imagine if Jesus asked if you love him? Do you understand that your baptism gives you a responsibility to spread his Word? Jesus forgives our sins and entrusts us with his mission. *Today's readings: Acts 25:13b–21; Psalm 103:1–2, 11–12, 19–20ab; John 21:15–19.*

Saturday, May 18 Keep Your Focus

The disciples were people like you and me with faults and gifts. They could become distracted with their vocation and inquire about what the future holds for another. When Peter asked about the disciple whom Jesus loved, our Lord replied, "What concern is it of yours? You follow me." In our parish communities, people can be distracted by what is not their concern. Take care to be attentive to your role and vocation. Today's readings: Acts 28:16–20, 30–31; Psalm 11:4, 5, 7; John 21:20–25.

Come Celebrate the Rite of Reception at the Vigil

ext Saturday, join us for the celebration of the Pentecost Vigil at 4:00 p.m. Mass. The Pentecost Vigil is an ancient tradition reclaimed with the publication of the revised Roman Missal in 2011. The Vigil, like the Easter Vigil, has an extended Liturgy of the Word (although much shorter), which "reflect[s] on the Church's teaching on the Holy Spirit's power to redeem."

"Spanish theologian Father Juan Manuel Sierra López . . . explains that the Pentecost vigil focuses on an exuberant celebration of the Holy Spirit": 2

The texts of the Vigil of Pentecost celebrate this outpouring of the Holy Spirit and help the faithful, gathered in prayer, to welcome the divine gift that continues to operate in the Church down through the centuries . . . Through the sacramental reliving of this mystery in the liturgy, we can give witness to the Risen Lord, who sits at the right hand of the Father.³

On this evening, we will also celebrate the Rite of Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church for three individuals. This means they will make a profession of faith, receive the sacrament of confirmation, and make their first Holy Communion; they will be fully initiated into the Catholic faith. Pentecost is a great time to celebrate the Spirit's movement in their lives!

THE VIGIL Mass for Pentecost Sunday may be extended with additional readings and prayers. The practice may not be observed in most parishes where the Saturday night Mass elapses under a tight schedule, but for those with time to give, the Vigil of Pentecost offers a profound experience.

The Easter Vigil features up to nine Scripture readings, together with a series of psalms and prayers during the Liturgy of the Word. It is, in the words of St. Augustine, "the mother of all vigils" because it is so grand and has given birth to other forms of keeping vigil before the Lord's Day.

Accordingly, the Pentecost Vigil may now be expanded. At Mass, when the extended form is used, the Glory to God is omitted before the Collect. Then the priest invites the people to keep vigil for the promised coming of the Spirit, as the apostles, the disciples, and Mary the Mother of Jesus did on the first Pentecost.

The Liturgy of the Word may include four Old Testament readings: the tower of Babel, Moses on Mount Sinai, Ezekiel's vision of dry bones, and the prophecy of Joel. A Responsorial Psalm and a prayer follow each reading. After the fourth Old Testament reading, the Glory to God is sung, and the priest offers another Collect. All this resembles the Easter Vigil's Liturgy of the Word. Mass resumes with the New Testament reading from Paul to the Romans and then continues as usual to the end.

The entire Mass may also be blended with Evening Prayer. The psalms of Evening Prayer may expand the Introductory Rites, and the Magnificat may be sung after Communion.

It will not be to everyone's taste, but there may be an occasion when your community wishes to take a little extra time to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and the expanded vigil provides an enriching opportunity.

SACRAMENTS AT THE SERVICE OF COMMUNION

This month Family Faith Formation explores the sacraments at the service of communion: matrimony and holy orders.

In the sacrament of matrimony, the bride and the groom are the ministers, conferring the sacrament by their mutual exchange of consent in the presence of the Church's minister and the witnesses. This consent must be freely given and may not be coerced in any fashion. Either a priest or a deacon assists at the celebration and receives their consent in the name of the Church and offers the Church's blessing.

Through the sacrament, a perpetual and exclusive bond is created between the spouses. They are strengthened and consecrated for their role to help one another attain holiness in their life and to welcome and form any children they may have.






