had a wonderful formation director when I was in graduate school. She helped me see the world and my ministry with new and ever-adapting lenses. Barbara Sutton, in my opinion, is a treasure for the Church as she has accompanied hundreds of pastoral ministers over the many years of her ministerial career; she helped them grow into competent, thoughtful, and engaged ministers. One of the programs she developed while I was in grad school was Seeing the Word, which uses illuminations from the Saint John's Bible to illuminate the Word in prayerful contemplation. We used this program here at the parish during Easter 2023. The Seeing the Word website says, "Participants LISTEN and MEDITATE on Scripture, SEE with eyes of faith as they gaze on illuminations, PRAY to God, CONTEMPLATE the Spirit's movements, and reflect how they might further BECOME CHRIST-LIKE." These are the six prayerful steps of the visio divina (holy seeing) process.

Barbara, and so many other mentors, have helped me see the Word not only in art, but also in the proclamation of the Word, in my accompaniment of students in my religion classroom, in my diocesan and parish ministry these twenty plus years. As we grow in faith and strengthen our discipleship as a parish and as individuals, I invite you to practice seeing the Word. Allow God's Word to transform your heart and rouse you see with the eyes of faith.

The cover art for this week's bulletin is from the Saint John's Bible. The illumination, titled Two Cures, depicts the gospel narrative we hear at today's Mass (Mark 5:21–43). I invite you to spend some time gazing upon the illumination in a prayerful manner and contemplating the Scripture apart from Mass, throughout the week. Pay attention to what words, phrases, or details of the image you are

drawn to and bring them into prayer. Ask the Holy Spirit to illuminate your heart and make you aware of what God is inviting you to learn and embody from this story. I know we're not all artist and this may seem impossible, but I encourage you try it. There's no right or wrong way of praying with the image or the text of the Mark's gospel.

To aid your prayer, below is an excerpt from Susan Sink's book The Art of the Saint John's Bible: A Reader's Guide to the Pentateuch, Psalms,

Gospels, and Acts (Liturgical Press, 2007, p. 66).

THE PRACTICE OF VISIO DIVINA

She had head about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crown and touched his cloak, for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." - Mark

Why do you think the artist showed the healing miracles this way, rather than with a dramatic image of someone before and after being healed?

Iconography is employed again in the story of the healing of the woman with hemorrhages and the daughter of the leader at the synagogue. The panels make great use of the structure of the story. The woman who touches the hem of his garment appears as he is going to the girl's home. A story of faith is inserted inside a story of faith. A woman who is unclean is bold in reaching out to touch Jesus. Jairus travels from the synagogue to where Jesus is to get him to lay hands on his daughter so that she may be healed. Observe Jesus' hands in the illustrations. In the first he makes a sign of blessing, in the second, he holds up his cloak, from which power has gone out, and in the third he grasps the wrist of the girl, while again making the sign of blessing.

In these images, also, Jesus is surrounded. The boy in the crowd breaks the frame of the second panel, showing how large the crow is that surrounds him. Three figures join him in the other panels, old and young, of different levels of

NOVENA PRAYER TO ST. THOMAS THE APOSTLE

Prayed daily from June 24 to July 3

SIGN OF THE CROSS

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

PRAYER

Lord Jesus, Saint Thomas doubted your resurrection until he touched your wounds. After Pentecost, you called him to become a missionary in India but he doubted again and so no. He changed his mind only after being taking into slavery by a merchant who



happened to be going to India. Once he was cured of his doubt, you freed him and he began the work you called him to do. As the patron saint against doubt, I ask him to pray for me when I question the direction in which you are leading me. Forgive me for mistrusting you, Lord, and help me to grow from the experience.

Saint Thomas the Apostle, pray for me.

Almighty and ever-living God, who did strengthen your apostle Thomas with sure and certain faith in your Son's resurrection: grant us so perfectly and without doubt to believe in Jesus Christ, our Lord and our God, that our faith may never be found wanting in your sight, through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God, now and for ever. Amen.

SHOULD WE BE INTINCTING?

ANY MINISTERS of Holy Communion can tell you this story: They offer the cup to the next person in line, "The Blood of Christ." The communicant answers, "Amen." But instead of taking the cup, the communicant dips the host in the cup, pops it in the mouth, and slips back to the pew. Intinction, right? Wrong. Our Church does not invite the faithful to this method of receiving Communion.

We offer several methods for receiving Communion. We may receive the Body of Christ on the tongue or in the hand. We may accept the Blood of Christ from the cup. In some parts of the Catholic world, the Blood of Christ is administered through a tube or spoon.

We also have intinction: The priest dips a particle into the chalice and, showing it, says: "The Body and Blood of Christ." The communicants respond: "Amen," receive Communion in the mouth, and return to their places.

The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments forbids communicants to intinct the host themselves into the chalice, "nor to receive the intincted host in the hand" (Redemptionis Sacramentum, 104).

Ever since lesus appointed the disciples to distribute the great multiplication of loaves, we have designated certain ministers to offer holy food to the faithful. This simple distinction helps us all approach the Communion Table with reverence like beggars, not thieves. We do not "take" Communion so much as we "receive" it.

Even with intinction, we do not stretch forth our own hands to dip the hosts into the wine, like chip-and-dip

football appetizers. If intinction is offered, the priest completes the action before placing Communion directly in



the mouth of the faithful.

Shortly after Vatican II, intinction enjoyed some popularity. However, when we got permission to take the Body of Christ in the hand, intinction became less attractive. The minister couldn't place a damp host in the hands of the faithful.

Besides, the two separate actions of eating and drinking helped us connect the Eucharist with the Last Supper and with the way we eat at home. These actions deepen the sense of mystery that our all-powerful God comes to us in the ordinary forms of bread and wine.

Sunday Scriptures at Home

MANY PEOPLE find it helpful to pray over the Sunday Scripture readings at home before going to church. The practice puts them in touch with the Church's prayer, helps them listen as the readings are proclaimed at Mass, prepares them to hear the homily, and engages them personally in the Word of God.

The Sunday readings are available in many publications and online at www.usccb.org. To prepare the readings at home, get a copy of them, or just get the citations and look them up in a Bible. Create some time and space for this prayer. If you do it alone, remove yourself from other activities. Choose a place where you can center yourself. Open the Scriptures and read over them. You might keep a journal and jot down some thoughts that come to you. Ask yourself some questions such as these: "What is going on in this reading? Is something similar happening in my life? What is God saying to me this week?"

If you pray with others, choose a time when everyone is together. You could pray in the living room at the end of the day or around the table before a meal. Someone reads the Scripture aloud. All think about it. Then each shares a few thoughts. Read the passage again. You may choose one or more readings at a time. The exercise can be repeated throughout the week. God's word is able to go as deep inside you as you give it time and room.

When you get to church, do not read along while the readings are proclaimed. Lift your head and open your ears and heart to the Word of God.




